**WHEREAS**, Día de los Muertos is shrouded in duality, from painting only half of one's face, symbolizing the quick passage from life to death, to the eye-catching marigold flowers said to guide the spirits to their altars through their vibrant colors and scent; and

**WHEREAS**, local Hispanic businesses promote Día de Los Muertos through selling marigolds, face paints, crafts, decorations, pan de Muertos (bread of the dead), and tamales, enjoyed by the living as much as the dead; and

**WHEREAS**, this year, *Una Mano Amiga* will display Día de los Muertos Altars at Trolley Square and the Utah State Capitol from October 29 through November 2 to create a broader opportunity for visitors to not only view displays, but join the celebration in honoring the loss of family members, friends, and community heroes; and

**WHEREAS**, Salt Lake City residents, businesses, and employees are invited to share in this opportunity to learn about Mexican culture and celebrate with loved ones both past and present.
