Firefighters are great community helpers, but did you know that firefighters do more than fight fire? There are many positions that firefighters hold in SLC Fire. One department with jobs other than fighting fire is the **Community Relations Department.** This presentation is going to introduce the CRD and show you what the CRD does.







Engage and Pass It On

SLC Fire Department engages with the community to educate, inform, recruit and mentor. The division that organizes these efforts is the Community Outreach Division.



Intro to Community Relations Division

There are six individuals in the CRD and here are the positions they hold: Chief **Administrative Captain** Captain / Public Information Officer **Education Specialist Recruit and Outreach Coordinator** Firefighter Development Coordinator







The employees of the Community Relations Division are community helpers that help by informing, educating, and engaging with and for the community.









Have you ever seen a story on the news about fire safety or a fire in Salt Lake City? Then you may have seen our Public Information Officer.

This job interacts with the community through the media and social media to keep our city and neighbors informed.

The job of Public Information Officer is a captain position. This person is a sworn firefighter who holds the rank of captain. Our current PIO is

Captain Shaun Mumedy.







Cpt. Mumedy is on fire scenes keeping the public informed and safe.





Captain Shaun Mumedy has served 17 years as a sworn firefighter. He was an engineer firefighter. Engineers drive the apparatus, handles the ladders and calculates the water needs and flow at a fire. He has held several positions with SLC Fire including logistics.
Cpt. Mumedy would advise students wanting to prepare to become firefighters to learn as much as you can in school, be physically fit, show kindness and be willing to help others.







When not serving at SLC Fire, Cpt. Mumedy enjoys traveling, time on the water, and with his family.





Firefighter Wilcox teaches and facilitates courses at the SLC Career & Technical Center. His job is to educate and mentor youth. He is a sworn firefighter dedicated to community outreach through education.



CTE Courses

SLC Fire, under the direction of Firefighter Wilcox, offers courses at the SLC Career and Technical Training school (CTE). These courses are offered to high school students and help students get hands-on experience and explore career options. Students can earn UVU and SLCC credits, a wildland Red Card certificate and/or an EMT certificate.











Firefighter Wilcox teaches classes and informs students through community fairs about their career and educational opportunities.









Firefighter Wilcox serves on Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) in addition to being a certified instructor with the SLC School District and a sworn firefighter. He brings a Master's Degree of Public Service to his department service of 12 years.



Firefighter Wilcox demonstrates daily the skills and passion he brings to his position and shares with students a path to leading a life of service. He advises that you strive to be your best self and remember to add resiliency and mental wellness to your goals.
