years. These SLCDPU veterans take seriously their mission of service, and they understand the importance of passing knowledge along to newer employees.



Droplet's Phrase of the Month

Hey Droplet - what's the meaning of the word "flocculation"?



Science Direct defines "flocculation" as: "process in which suspended particles clump together because the attractive forces between them overcome any repulsive forces caused by like surface charges."

In simpler terms, flocculation is one step of the process to treat drinking water. It separates water molecules from sediment, which is then filtered from the water - making it safer (not to mention tastier) to drink.

Project Updates

Salt Lake City's Department of Public Utilities manages a number of construction projects to maintain and improve our system. Many of these projects are smaller in scale but we've highlighted a few of our larger projects below. If you're interested in learning more about other SLCDPU projects, please visit our website.

- New Water Reclamation Facility (WRF): progress on our largest project to date continues daily. During August 2023, our team celebrated a significant milestone: of the 87,000 cubic feet of concrete required to complete construction, over 50% of it has been placed. Check out more details about the new WRF project numbers.
- 2100 South Sewer Upgrades: in September, work will begin to replace and upgrade the sewer system under 2100 South between Highland Drive and Yuma Street (2030 East). The sewer line is nearing or over 100 years old, depending on the section and too small to serve the existing demand. This part of the Salt Lake City sewer system provides service to more than 4,000 properties. The project will improve sewer service in the area with a larger pipe made of new materials.
