



INTERACTING WITH POLICE



WHAT TO DO IF AN OFFICER HAS BUSINESS WITH YOU:

Salt Lake City Police Officers stop people everyday. It is a necessary part of their job.

A person may be stopped or approached by law enforcement for many reasons. These could include:

- · a traffic violation
- suspicious behavior
- · questioning as part of a criminal investigation
- · appearing to need help

A person could be stopped while driving or walking down the street. He or she could also be visited at home.

However, officers are required to respect people's rights—these rights protect everyone from:

- having to answer questions (other than ones about identification) that a person may not wish to answer
- · being held without probable cause
- · improper searches

If an officer has business with you, be sure you:

- stay calm
- do not become defensive or rude
- give your name, address and show your identification, if requested

You do not have to answer any other questions unless you want to.





If you are not free to leave, by law you have the right to:

- remain silent
- · have a lawyer with you while you are questioned

If you have a concern about how you were treated, you may file a complaint with the Internal Affairs Unit. You also may seek legal advice on your own.

IF YOU ARE STOPPED WHILE DRIVING:

If you are stopped while driving

An officer can pull you over if there is a good reason (probable cause) to believe a law has been broken.

You may be pulled over if:

- · you were driving too fast
- · you committed a traffic violation
- · your driving was posing a hazard
- your vehicle matches the description of one reported stolen or used in a crime
- you have faulty equipment




Officers also may stop vehicles at road blocks to check for possible violations.

What you should do:

- Pull over to the right when it is safe to do so.
 Come to a full stop.
- Turn on the interior light if you're stopped at night.
- Roll down your window and wait inside the vehicle for the officer. Listen for any instructions.
 Don't get out unless told to do so.
- Keep your hands on the steering wheel so the officer can see them.
- Tell an officer before reaching for any items.

When the officer approaches your vehicle:

- Be polite and respectful. Stay calm.
- Do not move suddenly-the officer may think you're making a threatening move



What may happen next?

- The officer may ask for your license and vehicle registration, or other identification.
- The officer may choose to give you a ticket. Sign it, if asked-doing this does not mean you're admitting guilt.

Don't argue with the officer. If you feel a ticket is not justified, you have the right to appeal it in court. If the officer asks to search your vehicle, it is your right to say no.

But the officer can search if:

- · he or she has a warrant
- something illegal is in plain view
- there are reasonable grounds (probable cause) for believing something illegal is inside
- you are arrested

The officer also may do a "pat-down" search to check for any weapons on your person-if the officer has a reasonable basis to fear for his or her safety. Stay calm. Help make the traffic stop go as smoothly and quickly as possible.



IF A POLICE OFFICER COMES TO YOUR HOME:

Ask to see photo identification, especially if an officer is not in a uniform.

Officers may come to your home if:

- there is a complaint-loud noises, for example
- someone in the home called 9-1-1 or could be in danger
- you may play a role in a criminal investigation
- they need to alert you to a problem in the neighborhood

In most cases, officers need a warrant to enter your home-either an arrest warrant or a search warrant.

Officers may enter without a warrant if:

- you choose to let them in
- someone's safety could be in danger
- evidence is in danger of being destroyed or removed
- · criminal activity is in plain view

If officers have a proper warrant, signed by a court official, you must let them in. A search warrant allows officers to search your home–but only for the specific items named in the warrant.

Check to see that:

- the warrant is for your address
- you get a written receipt for any personal property taken

An arrest warrant allows officers to make an arrest and to search the immediate area where the arrest is made. Check the warrant to be sure they have the right person. The law gives you responsibilities and rights. Knowing them can make a difference, whether you are stopped while driving, stopped on foot, or visited at home.

You should:

- try to work with law enforcement-be polite and respectful
- · know and understand your rights





HOW TO CONTACT THE POLICE

Call us:

If you are experiencing an emergency, call 911.

Non-Emergency: (801) 799-3000.

If you require an officer to respond but it isn't an emergency, call this number. The non-emergency phone number keeps our 911 phone lines open to help those who require an emergency response. You also may want to check out our online reporting options, which generally are good for cases that have no suspect information and no injuries but require a police report for insurance purposes.

If you need directions to the Public Safety Building, lobby hours, or seek to follow-up on an old case and do not remember the case number or investigator's name. This is not the number to start a case or file a complaint.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL RESPONSE GUIDE



EMERGENCY CARE:

This is for when you have a health problem that happens suddenly and is very serious. It can be life-threatening or affect important parts of your body.

Conditions that need emergency care include:

- · Serious trouble breathing
- Chest pain
- · Heavy bleeding
- Passing out or losing consciousness
- Severe burns
- Drug overdose
- Poisoning
- Stroke (a serious brain problem)
- · Major broken bones

Call 911 or go to the nearest Hospital Emergency Room:

If you call 911, you can talk to someone who will send help to your location and take you to the Emergency Room.

- If you are not sure if it is an emergency, call 911.
- Be ready to tell the dispatcher your address, phone number, and what is wrong with you.
- At the hospital, you will be treated based on how serious your condition is, and other people in the Emergency Room will be considered, too.
- There is no cost for emergency personnel to come to your home.
- Going to the hospital by ambulance or getting treatment in the Emergency Room can be expensive. You will need to pay for this either with your own money or with insurance.
- The emergency medical team is there to help you get the best care possible.





URGENT CARE:

These are health problems that are not emergencies but still need to be treated within 24 hours.

Conditions include:

- · Sore throat or cough
- Fever
- Headaches
- Earaches
- · Mild asthma
- Nausea or vomiting
- Sprains or strains
- Minor broken bones
- Minor cuts
- Animal bites
- Rashes
- Urinary Tract Infection (UTI)

Go to an Urgent Care facility or clinic that is covered by your health insurance or visit a free/low-cost clinic. If you are not sure if you need urgent care, call your doctor or an urgent care clinic.:

- No appointment is needed for urgent care.
- The cost of urgent care is usually less than 10% of the cost of an Emergency Room visit.
- Interpreter services are available.
- If you have health insurance, check with your insurance company to make sure the urgent care facility or clinic is covered by your plan.




PREVENTIVE CARE:

Vaccines, health tests, and regular check-ups.

If you have health insurance through a private or state program, preventive care is often free if you go to a clinic that is covered by your plan. If you do not have insurance, you can visit one of the free or low-cost clinics listed in this community resource guide on pg. 17.







Housing Resources

TENANT RESOURCE CENTER

The Tenant Resource Center is a place in Salt Lake City where renters can get help with their housing needs. It's run by people from the Community Development Corporation of Utah (CDCU). Think of it as a single place to go for help. These helpers can connect renters with different services, such as help if they're facing eviction, information about affordable places to live, and even support for basic needs like food and childcare.

UTAH COMMUNITY ACTION RENT AND DEPOSIT ASSISTANCE

This program is for people who are renting and have suddenly faced a financial problem they couldn't have prevented. To get help, you need to either already have a rental agreement (lease) or be able to sign one soon. The program can help pay for your security deposit or your rent. However, it cannot help with mortgage payments, or payments to roommates or family members. Any money provided will be paid directly to your landlord or the company that manages your rental property.

The Home Energy Assistance Target (HEAT) program helps people with low incomes in Utah pay for their energy bills throughout the entire year. If you apply for HEAT, you might be able to get help. The program's year runs from October 1st to September 30th each year. However, the program can stop giving out money earlier if funds for it run out.

Transportation

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION //

Salt Lake City has a public transportation system that helps you get around. The **Utah Transit Authority (UTA)** runs buses and trains (called **TRAX**) in the city. You can use **TRAX** to travel quickly, and buses go to more places.

You can pay for a ride with cash, a smart card, or a **UTA pass**. Many bus stops and train stations have signs in different languages. You can also use a free **UTA app** to help you find your way. Public transportation is a great way to go to work, school, or shopping in Salt Lake City.

You can find all the information you need about public transportation in Salt Lake City on the Utah Transit Authority (UTA) website at https://www.rideuta.com/. It has details about routes, schedules, prices, and how to pay for your ride.

USE A HIVE PASS

The Hive Pass is a discounted UTA transit pass available to all Salt Lake City residents to make transit more affordable and accessible. Your home address must be within Salt Lake City boundaries (https://www.slc.gov/transportation/wp-content/uploads/sites/11/2023/10/Map-for-website.png) to be eligible for a Hive Pass.

The pass costs \$42.00 per month, a 75% discount from a regular monthly UTA pass. You may pre-purchase for an entire year for \$475. That's an additional \$29 discount!

You can use the Hive Pass on UTA local bus service, TRAX, the S-Line streetcar, UTA On Demand, and FrontRunner. Hive Passes also include a free one-year GREENbike membership!

DRIVER'S LICENSE AND CAR REGISTRATION //

If you are new to Utah and want to get a driver's license and register a car, here's how you can do it.

- 1. You need to visit the Utah Driver License Division (DLD) at https://dld.utah.gov/
 - To get a driver's license, you will need to bring proof of your identity, like a passport or green card, and take a driving test.
 - You will also need to pass a vision test and a written test about traffic rules.
- 2. To register a car, visit the Division of Motor Vehicles website at https://dmv.utah.gov/register
 - You will need to show the car's title and proof of insurance and pay a fee.

About the writing driving test:

The written knowledge test is offered in Utah's most spoken languages, other than English, to an applicant applying for an original or a renewal of a regular (Class D) driver's license or learner permit.

BICYCLES //

Biking is a key part of how people move around Salt Lake City—and we're committed to making it better. The City's bicycle initiatives seek to improve safety, enhance quality of life, provide sustainable and healthy transportation choices, and improve air quality in our region.

The city has many bike lanes and trails that are safe for riders. You can use a **bike share program** called **GreenBike** to rent a bike if you don't have your own.

- To ride a bike, you should wear a helmet for safety and follow traffic rules, like stopping at red lights and using hand signals when turning.
- Be aware of cars and always bike on the right side of the road.
- You can also find maps and information about bike routes on the city's website or at local bike shops. Riding a bike is a healthy and affordable way to travel around Salt Lake City!

HOW TO GET CITY SERVICES

On the Phone: When you call a Salt Lake City department in your language, and someone answers, you can ask for an interpreter. Just say you need an interpreter and tell them which language you speak. The city staff uses a service called Language Line to help with this.

In Person: When you go to a city office, and you need to speak in a language other than English, tell the person at the front desk or in the office, "I need an interpreter." Each city department should have a card that says "I speak" followed by a list of different languages. You can simply point to the language you need on the card.
