Project Background

In November 2022, Salt Lake City voters approved the Parks, Trails, and Open Space General Obligation (GO) Bond. \$10.5 million of the bond funding is dedicated to reimagining neighborhood parks, including at least one park in each City Council district. These parks were evaluated on a specific set of criteria and then approved by the City Council. Steenblik Park is one of the parks that will receive funding in District 1.

About the Park

Steenblik Park is a 0.61-acre park in the Rose Park neighborhood of Salt Lake City, located at 1050 W 800 N. It was built in 1984 with federal block grant funding and named after Joseph F. Steenblik as a part of the “Name the Park” competition. Joseph Steenblik was a beloved community member who grew up in the neighborhood and played a prominent role in building the community, literally and figuratively.

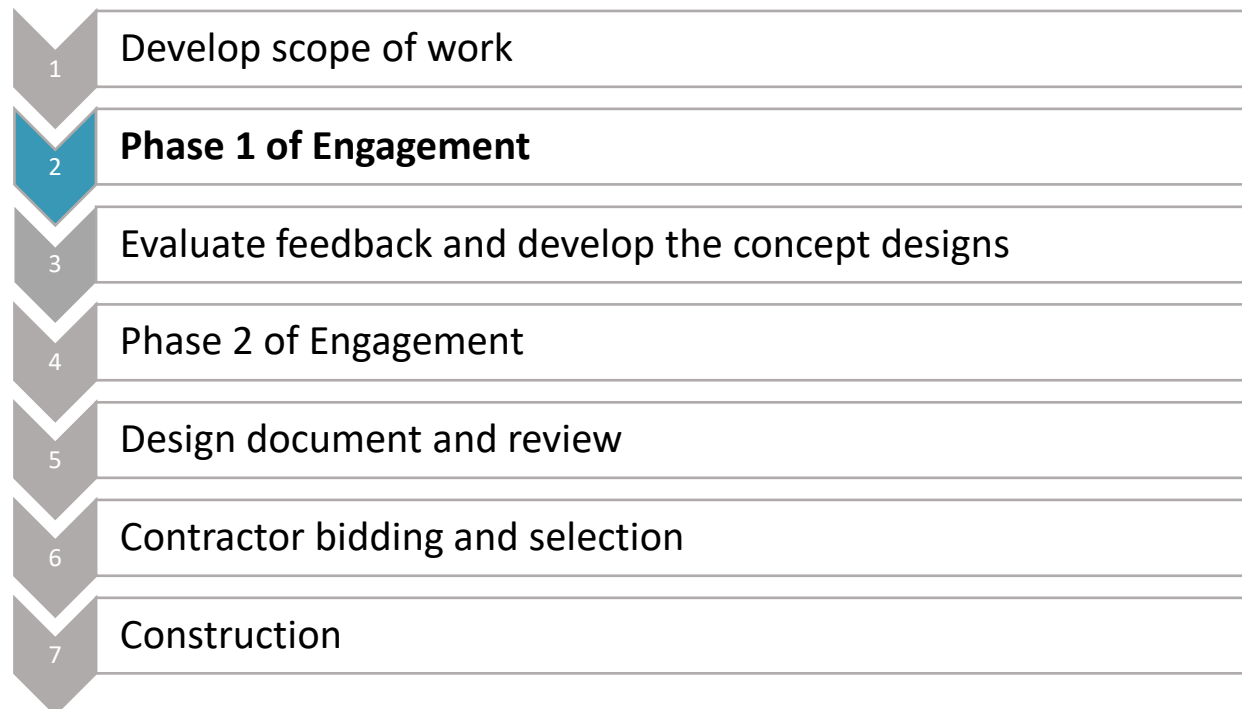
The large bronze-cast “Dairy Cats” sculptures were created by artist Day Christiansen in 2007. They pay homage to the Steenblik Dairy and the resident cats that kept mice at bay.



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Community Engagement

The first phase of public engagement for Steenblik Park was conducted from May to September 2023. During this process we heard directly from approximately 475 people. Participants helped us understand the current usage of the park, their desires for its future, and better understand the unique elements surrounding the neighborhood's identity and history of the park.



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What We Learned:

Values Identified:

- The “Dairy Cat” sculptures are treasured
- Enjoy nature and wildlife
- Having a place for children to play
- Enjoy passive open spaces for walks
- It’s a nice resting stop for people during walks

Desired Improvements:

- Increase the amount of shade
- Better storytelling signage about the Dairy Cat sculptures
- Diversify the landscaping. Some suggestions included: adding a community garden, trees, flowers, native plants, and/or a xeriscape area
- Add features to encourage gatherings, such as more benches, pavilions, and seating areas
- Improve the playground with all-abilities and all-ages features
- Incorporate cat theme into improvements
- Balance needs of diverse community (seniors, young adults, families, dog owners, people with disabilities, etc)

Pop-Up Event

Public Lands staff organized an engagement booth on July 18, 2023, strategically placed next to El Jarriepo taco truck in the Smith's grocery store parking lot, a little less than 1/2 mile from Steenblik Park. This event was thoughtfully planned to involve community members in yet another opportunity to share their feedback in person rather than through the online survey or other in-person events. The event showcased several posters with open-ended questions and pictures of the park on which visitors could provide feedback. Participants were invited to write their ideas on the posters or indicate where they wanted to see changes.

Generally, in-person comments were consistent with the online survey results. However, this particular engagement event provided more insight into the following items:

There is a desire for the playground feature updates to include the following:

- Play features for toddlers and older children
- Additional swings (including some with rigid seats)
- More climbing features
- Ziplines
- Removing openings where kids can fall
- Incorporating a cat theme

When people were asked what history, culture, or stories they would like reflected at the park, they provided the following suggestions:

- The present diversity of the Rose Park neighborhood
- The history of Rose Park, how immigrants built it, and why it is named such
- History of the "Dairy Cats" sculptures
- Art by local artists
- Rosie the Turkey





Next Steps

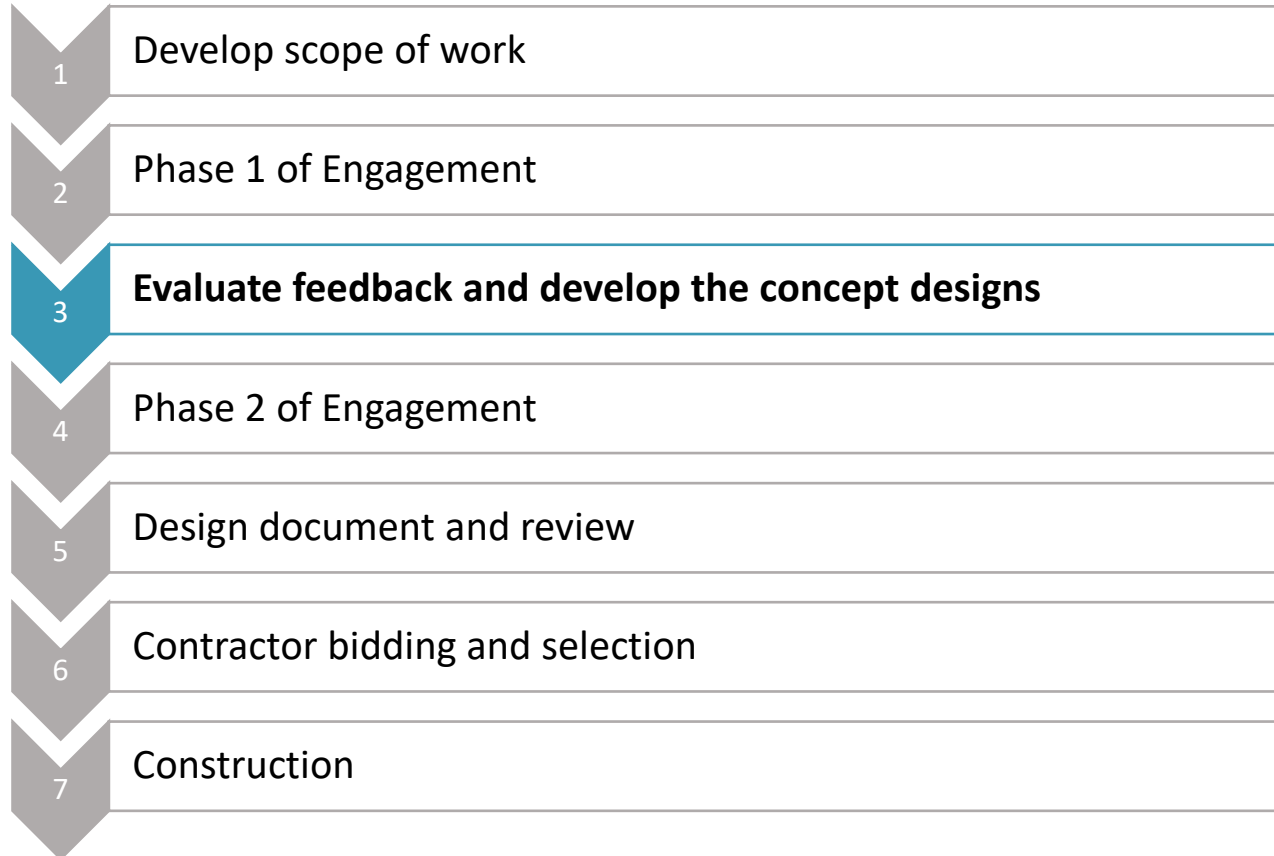

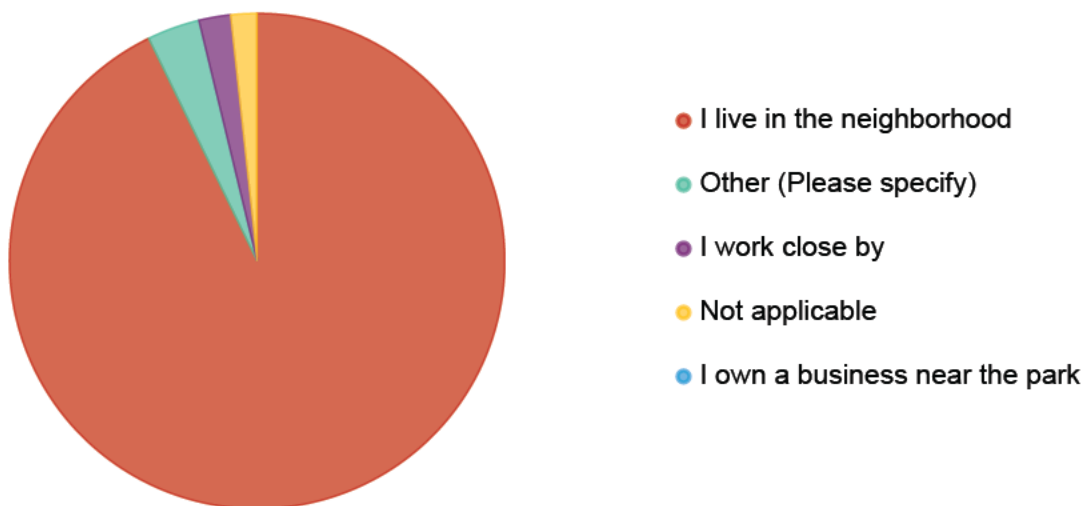

What is your relationship to the park?

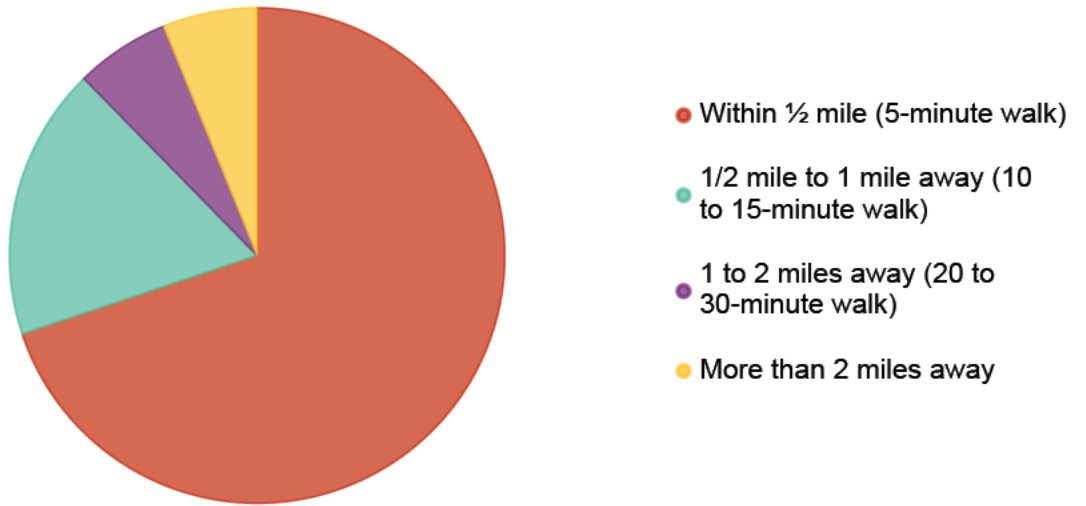

How far is the park from your home?

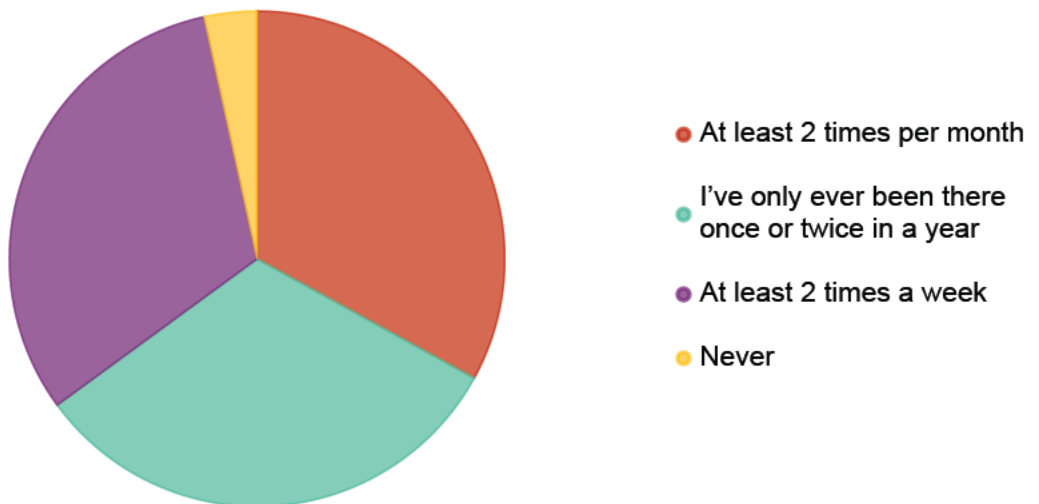

How often do you visit the Park?

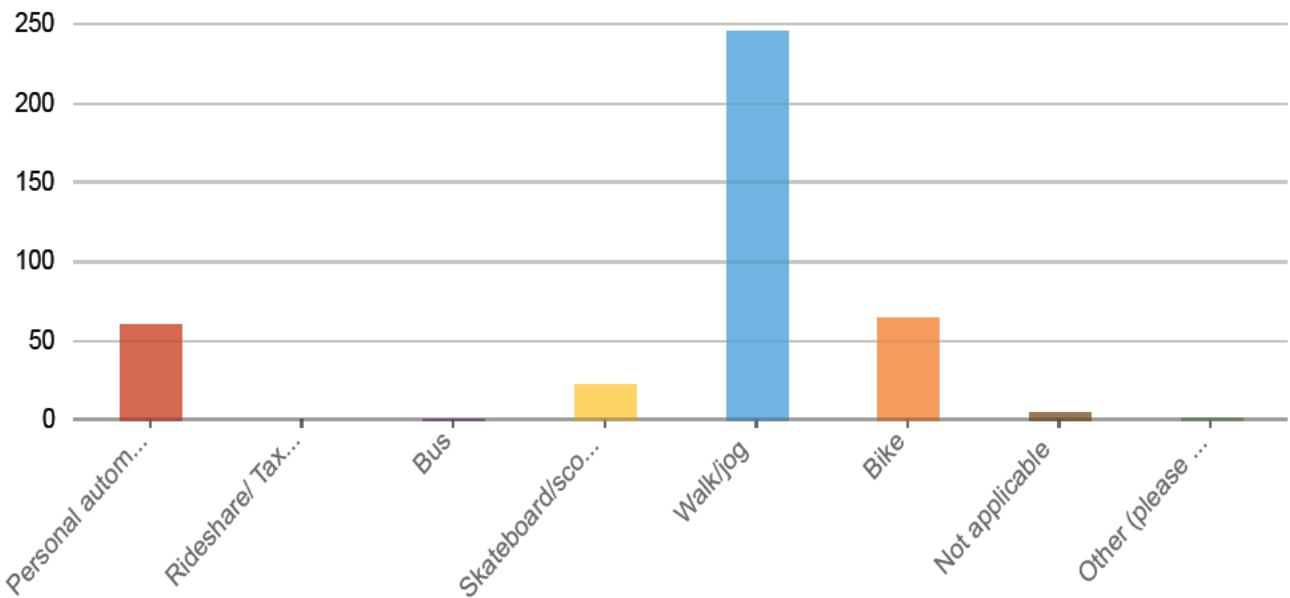

How do you usually get to the park?



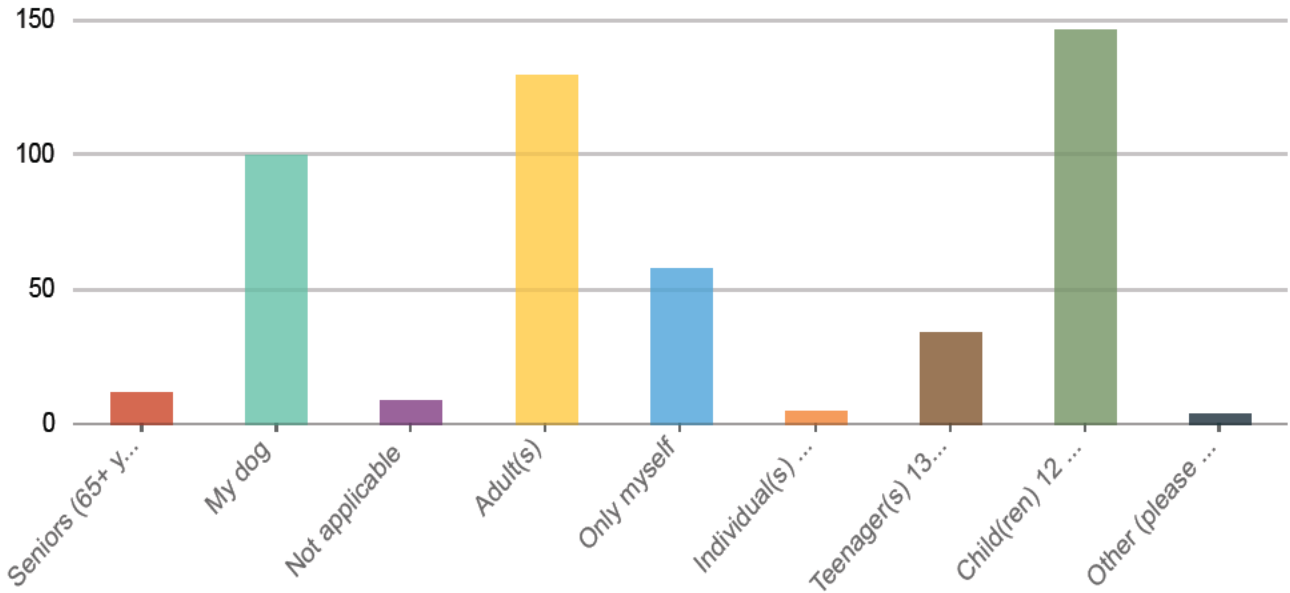

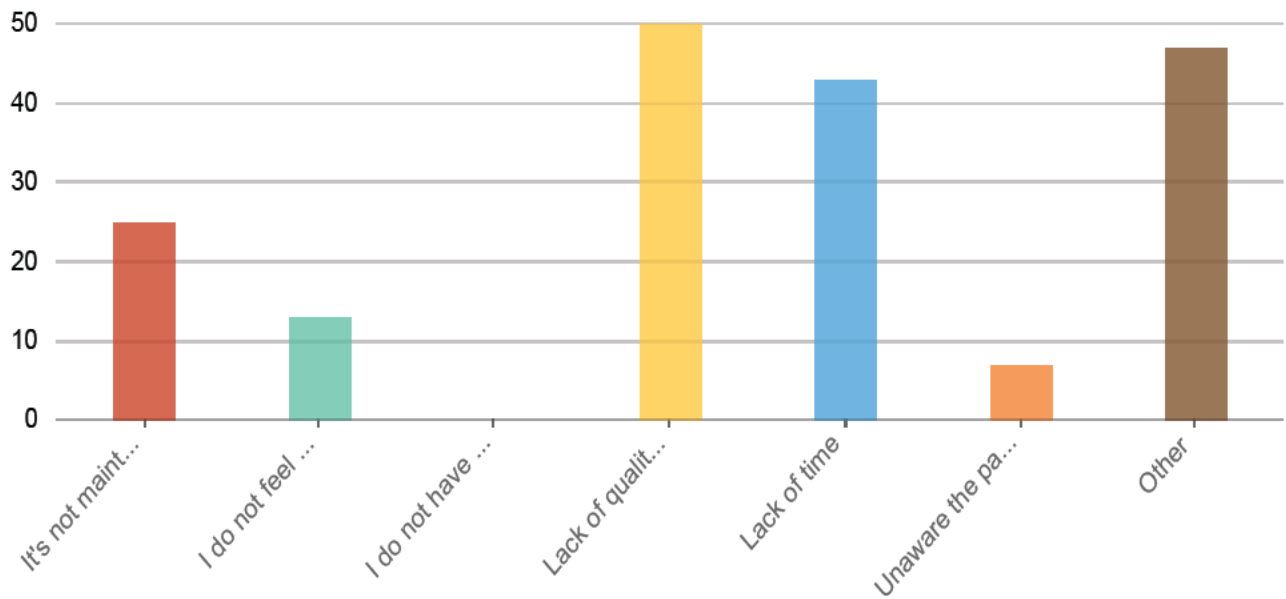
Who do you typically visit the park with?

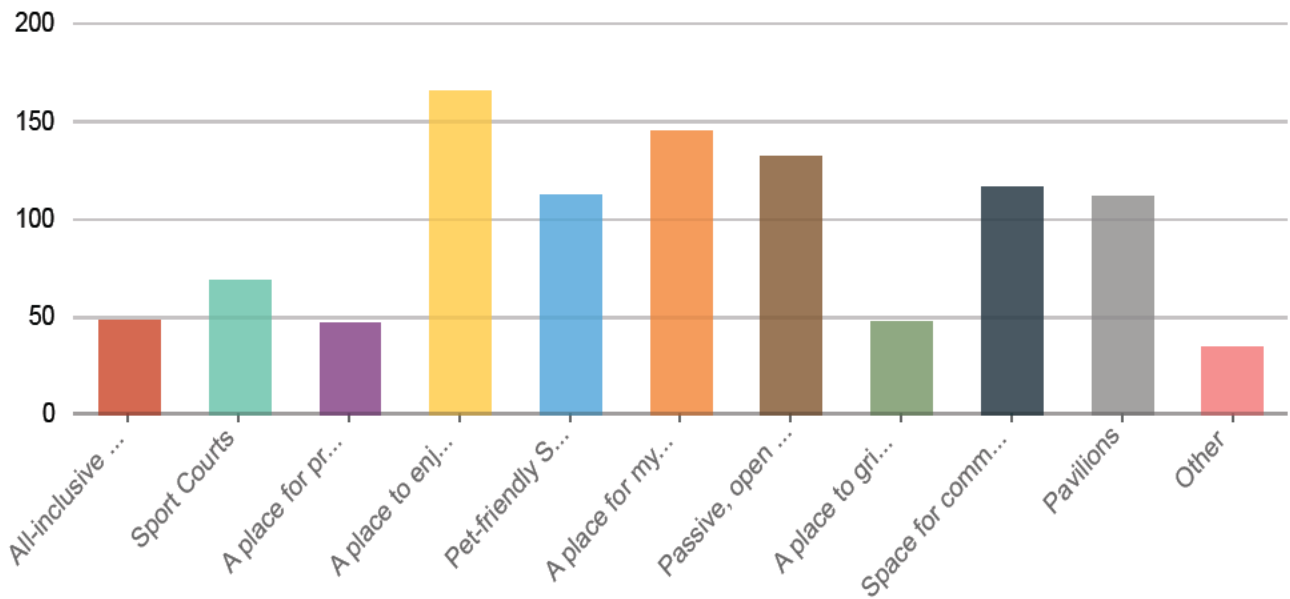

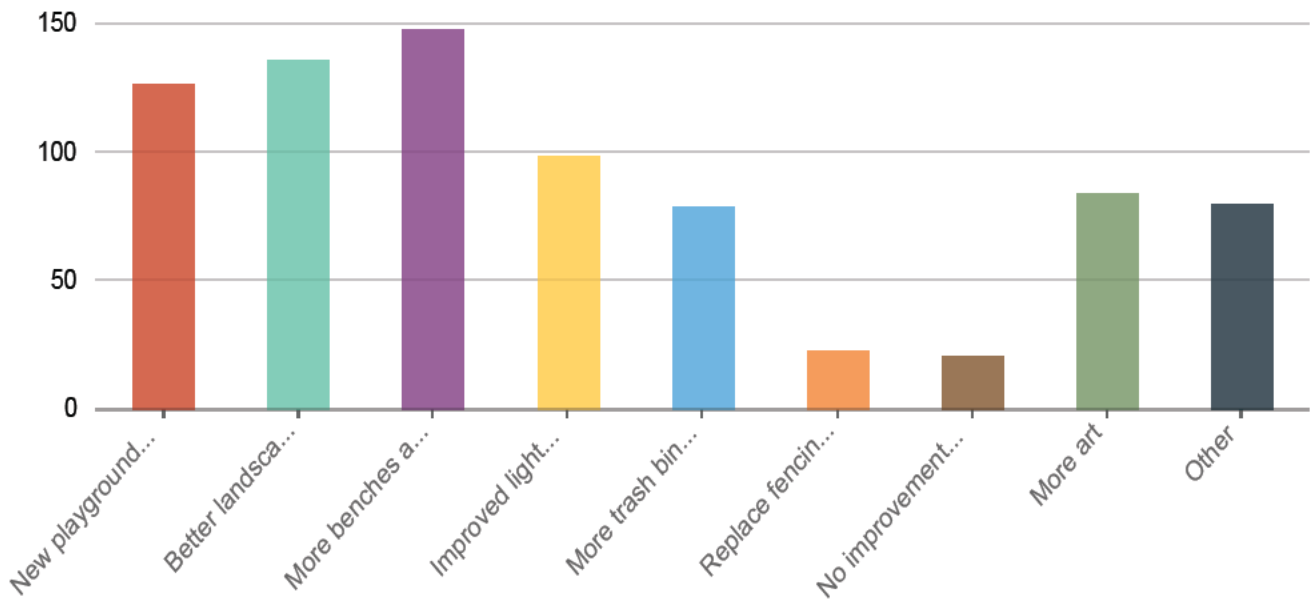

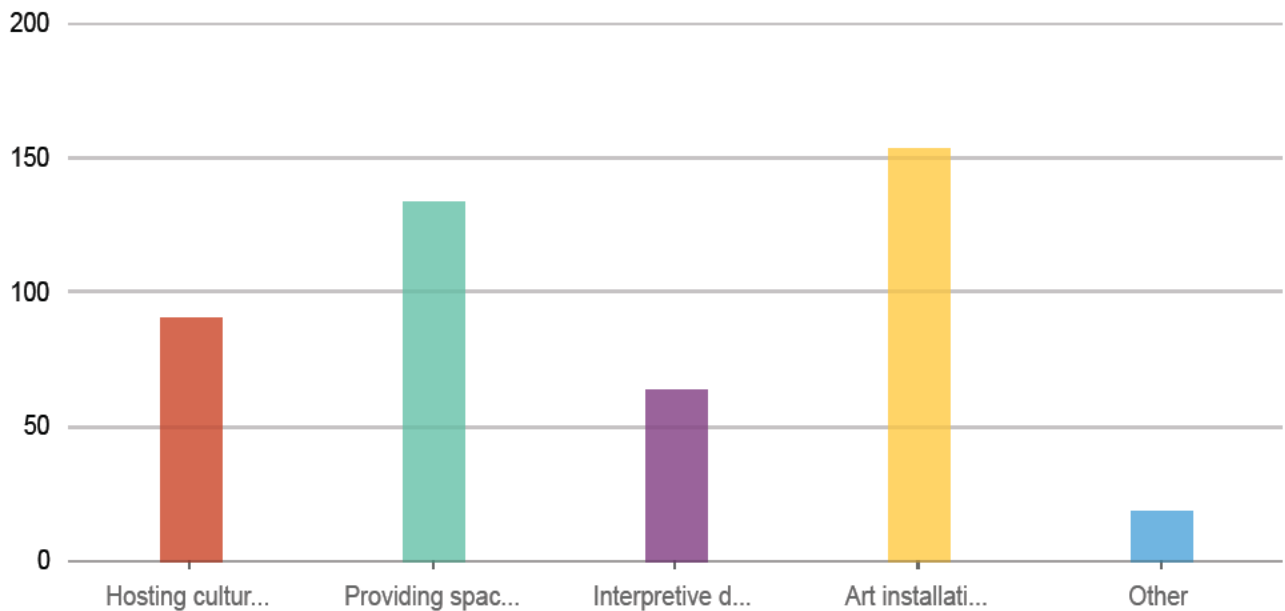
